






Oleisa Oil on linen 45cm x 35cm

Jessie Mae Winchester is an Irish artist. born 1982 in West Cork. She is currently based in Kinsale. Jessie Mae received her BA Honours Degree in Fine Art in 2009 at The Crawford College of Art & Design, where she specialised in Sculpture and Life Drawing. After her Degree Show titled, 'Site 46', where she received an Award from CIT for 'Best Exhibition Space', Jessie Mae became a member of The Pigeon House Studios, Kinsale in 2010 and now is working from her private studio in the Artistic Alliance Gallery, Cork city. She was invited to Noelle Campbell Sharp's Cill Riallaig artist residency project in Co. Kerry in September 2010 where she explored her concepts and practice. Many collectors are taking great interest and collecting Jessie Mae's work. She continues with her artwork between her studio and The National Sculpture Factory. Her unique style brings new life to each of her exhibitions.

It is my continual fascination to portray the figure in various forms and mediums in an attempt to capture moments and materials in time. This constantly fuels the inspiration for my work.

I have been gradually working outwards; from the forms found within a body, to the encasing, exterior forms of a figure.

I combine fundamental elements such as gold, chalk, oils, conte, graphite, resin, bronze and stone etc. I am fascinated with their material relevance, with regard to their physical existence in time and space, and their relationship to one another. Through each specific existence it is my intention to outline and raise a consciousness of our own physical and spiritual existence.

By using these temporary and permanent mediums, I envisage my drawings to be experiments. I outline the presence of material survival, acknowledging and possibly challenging the un-relentless ephemerality of life.


Whilst trying to capture the momentary poses of my model, snapshots of her physical form, her energy, vibrancy and existence, I am also referencing the human condition, which dates back to our beginnings; our fascination to preserve ourselves, our memories, our actions and our stories, protecting them from being lost in time.

I use techniques such as body printing, body casting and build armoured forms, as each one references a sense of encasement and defence, a barrier to hold in the present, define the past and quard against the future.



Fergus O'Farrell is well known and respected in music parlance for his work with *Interference* and to the many other artists that have collaborated with him over his long and illustrious career in the music business. He has enjoyed drawing and painting since he was a child. He uses the same strategy to create works in either field. That is to begin with a blank canvas onto which he makes a mark or spoils it and then to continuously improvise until some kind of balanced density is achieved. This can be done equally well improvising chords and vocals or canvas and paint. The paintings are a mixture of watercolour, acrylic, oil paints, printed material and collage.



During my last year in the Crawford I concentrated on the landscape of Slievenamon. Initially my work was small, but in the end I was working on quite a large scale. Recently I was looking at a series of small abstract monoprints I had made in 2003. I felt challenged to work with abstract forms on a larger scale. Working in this way was like opening a door into new territory, and I felt exhilarated and relieved to be working abstractly. With each canvas I discover anew an inner landscape, where some doors are closed and others opened. Perhaps I don't know where they lead to but I'm enjoying finding out.



Based in West Cork, Holger Lönze first studied architecture before turning to printmaking and sculpture at the University of Ulster, Belfast where he completed his studies with a PhD. After working as a researcher for the Eden Project, Cornwall, he returned to Ireland in 2004 to work predominantly on public commissions and as artist in residence for various county councils.

The wind-driven wave on the surface of the ocean yields an elemental metaphor for the shaping of materials by the sculptor's hands. It conveys the ancient fundamentals of sculpture that are used to model clay and to form metal: movement, rhythm, mass and volume. It is not surprising, therefore, that the wave is a powerful and archetypal image which recurs within Holger's work together with imagery of boats, sails, birds and fish - as living on the west coast of Ireland the sea plays a central role in his life. His work is a poetic response to Europe's Atlantic seaboard: from the legendary protagonists of its early literature to its folklife traditions steeped in rich maritime culture and heritage.

Informed by his voyages in self-made curachs, these archetypal vessels transform through his work into poetic objects, revealing our human urge to explore and discover. They become metaphorical vessels for our ideas, beliefs and desires. By combining cultural objects like boats, bells and horns with natural form and human anatomy in a single object. The simultaneous presence of their interlocking and intersecting shapes resonate with the ancient concept of the *otherworld*.

Holger employs the time-proven materials of bronze, wood and steel in combination with ancient and sustainable techniques including repoussé and Bronze-Age casting methods. Rich texture, distinctive patination and accentuated gilding, together with a well-informed realism, give the work an ancient, archaic and often mythological character. Large commission work installed in the public domain is juxtaposed with intimate, portable objects that can be experienced through handling and personal use.








